Ushbu maqola ergativ fe’llarning keng qamrovli tahlilini taqdim etadi. Xususan, ular moslashuvchan o‘timli shakllari va murakkab semantik farqlari bilan tavsiflangan til hodisalari sifatida ta’riflanadi. Bunda, ergativlikning semantik, sintaktik va nazariy jihatlarini batafsil o‘rganish orqali ushbu qiziqarli lingvistik hodisa haqidagi tushunchamizni chuqurlashtirish muhim ahamiyat kasb etadi. Dastlabki va empirik tadqiqotlardan olingan ma’lumotlarga tayangan holda, ergativ fe’llarning semantik jihatdan ko‘p qirraliligi, ularning turli tillardagi sintaktik xatti-harakati, ergativlikning til nazariyasi va tahlili uchun nazariy ahamiyati kabi asosiy mavzularni qamrab oladi.

When these verbs occur in transitive clauses they have a causative sense, and when they occur intransitively, they are non-causative and have what will be called an inchoative sense. Because of this capability to occur in both transitivity patterns with a switch in causativity, they are sometimes referred to as causative-inchoative alternation verbs and occasionally as “ergative” verbs. They are also referred to as labile verbs. The salient features of these verbs include the following:

1. They can occur in both transitive and intransitive patterns.
2. The subject of the intransitive patterns denotes the same kind of entities as the objects in corresponding transitive patterns.

Ergative verbs, a fascinating category within English syntax, exhibit a unique alternation in causativity, allowing them to convey different meanings depending on their syntactic context. In this article, we will explore the semantic features of English ergative verbs, shedding light on their distinct characteristics and usage patterns.

Dixon's typological approach lays the groundwork for further research into ergative phenomena and serves as a valuable resource for linguists and typologists alike.

In addition to typological studies, research on ergative verbs has also delved into specific linguistic phenomena and theoretical frameworks. For example, Hale's [1973] influential work on "Warlpiri and the Grammar of Non-configurational Languages" provides a detailed analysis of ergativity in Warlpiri, an indigenous Australian language, within the framework of non-configurational syntax. Hale's analysis highlights the intricate interplay between ergativity, word order, and argument structure in non-configurational languages, contributing to our understanding of language universals and syntactic variation. The literature on ergative verbs spans a rich tapestry of theoretical frameworks, empirical studies, and methodological approaches, illuminating the multifaceted nature of ergativity and its relevance to the study of human language.

when used transitively, while subjects of intransitive verbs are marked with the absolutive case. This syntactic pattern reflects a unique alignment of arguments that differs from the nominative-accusative alignment found in most Indo-European languages. Additionally, ergative verbs may exhibit split ergativity, where ergative-absolutive alignment applies in certain syntactic contexts while nominative-accusative alignment applies in others, adding further layers of complexity to their syntactic behavior.

Moreover, corpus-based studies have contributed valuable empirical data on the distribution and usage of ergative constructions in natural language. Corpus linguistics methodologies, such as those employed by Levin and Rappaport Hovav [1995] in their study “Unaccusativity: At the Syntax-Lexical Semantics Interface,” offer insights into the frequency, collocational patterns, and diachronic changes of ergative verbs in large-scale linguistic corpora. Through quantitative analysis of corpus data, researchers gain valuable insights into the usage and evolution of ergative constructions across different registers, genres, and historical periods.

By allowing verbs to convey different shades of meaning depending on their syntactic context, ergative constructions enable speakers to express a wide range of actions and events with precision and clarity.
